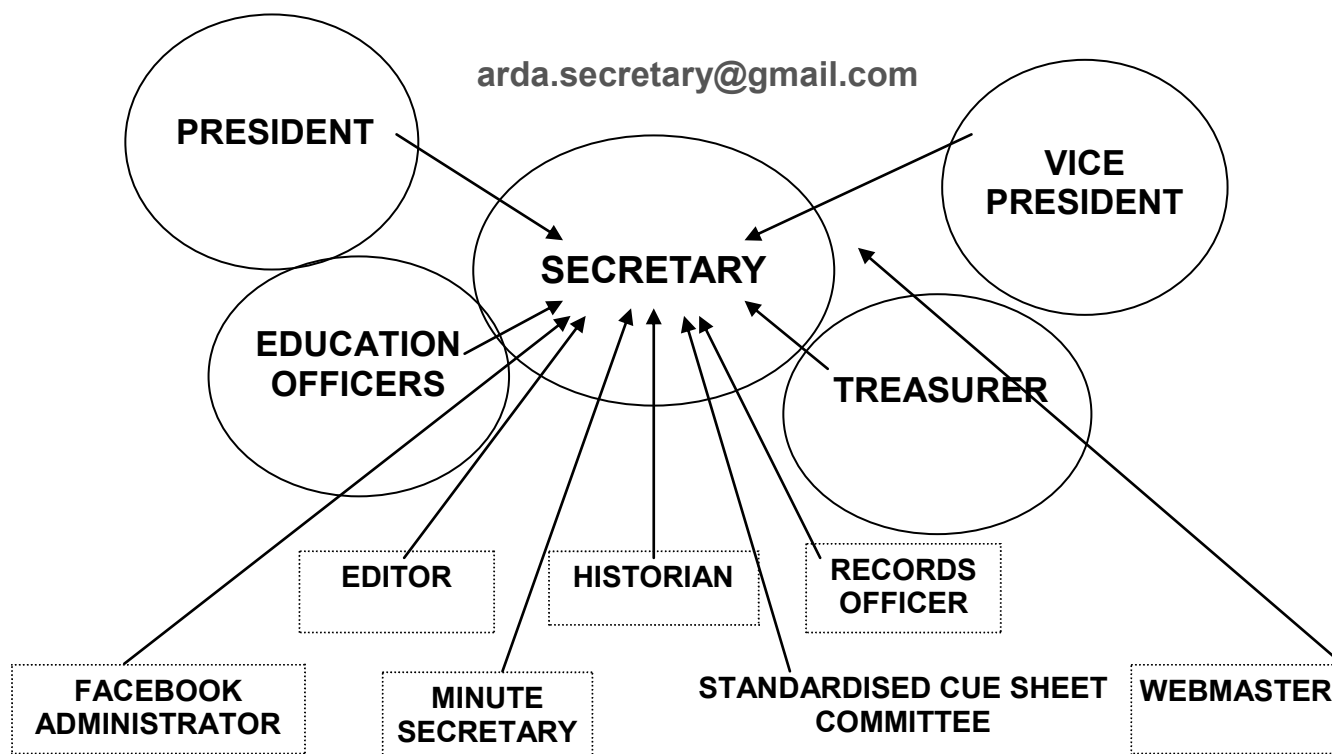

As the Minutes of this meeting are not available for distribution at this time, here are some of the changes ratified at the 2019 AGM.

- JIVE will not be included in Category A rhythms. It is hoped to 'wet' the appetites of those who love the energy jive brings.
- Length of dances - make sure you read the Showcase & Experimental Criteria distributed in the past week. There is a need to be aware of the length of a dance, both for our dancers and programming round dance sessions.
- More than one nomination is required. When a problem with a nomination is found it tends to cause stress for both the programmer (meeting the deadline for a program) and the State/Territory in trying to source a substitute nomination. All of this information is the amended Criteria sent to you via email/surface mail.

- A Minute Secretary has been appointed to relieve the Secretary of one of the many jobs that have 'crept' into this busy role.
- Yeah! We now have a Facebook Admin who will work towards reaching a wider audience of round dancers to alert them of upcoming events. Contact or requests for displaying flyers, sharing information, must come be via the ARDA Secretary.

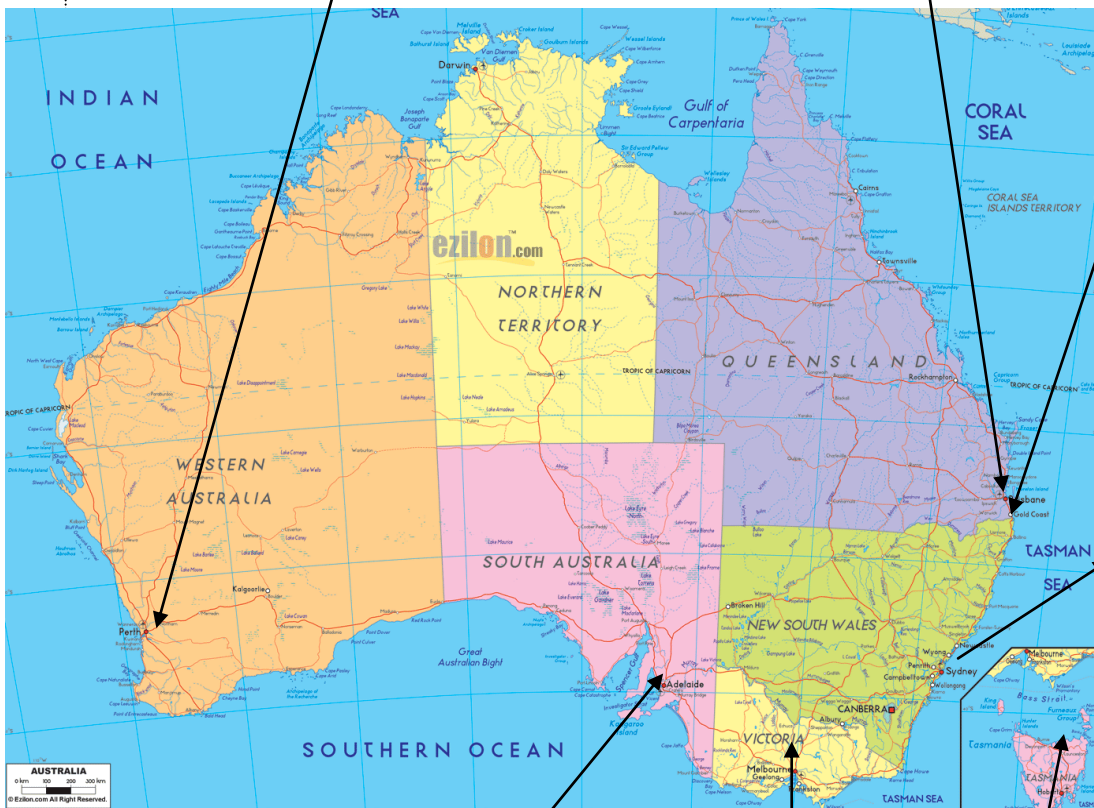

What a great weekend it turned out to be. Our first was a small-scale arrangement with mostly local dancers as the venue was only finalised back in March. Around 30 people over the weekend enjoyed two nights of general dancing and two days of dance teaching with Paula and myself. With the front of the hall opening out to ocean and parklands, this must be one of the most scenic halls around.

For those not familiar with the geography, Kingscliff is about 15 minutes’ drive from the Gold Coast Airport and is just on the NSW side of the border in the Tweed Heads area. # The three Amigos

The Three Amigos off to Tassie

Well guys, Dad said, it's off to Tasmania for a few weeks and guess what that means - boat rides for you and that's something you've never experienced before.

So off we go – Uncle Tony's at Wingham for the first night stop after a farewell to Mum as we went through the Gold Coast. Our next overnight stop was at Holbrook beside some submarines in the park. Was this an omen for our boat trip – hopefully not. On to Melbourne and a catch up Dad's (twin) sister and brother-in-law before heading to a street park near the boat terminal; this would save Dad competing with peak hour traffic in the morning.

Sadly the boat was late to arrive and depart but it did allow Dad to reminisce about the Peninsula and summer holidays as a child – Mt Martha, Dromana, McCrae lighthouse, Rosebud, Sorrento and Portsea before we finally went through the Heads and into Bass Strait. The change was noticeable but we were fortunate for a relatively smooth crossing – no upset tummies for us!! By the time we had got off the boat, Dad was content to look for a level spot for the night and where else but Bunnings Car park. Saturday saw us off to Sheffield for some AdBlue (diesel exhaust cleaner in commercial vehicles), but that was very slow to put in. Apparently, it needed an adaptor to fit between the bowser pump and the tank, something Dad didn't find out til after he had finished.

So it was off to Deloraine to unpack, move into the house and catch up with Nana CAS and Auntie Paula & Uncle Warwick. Mum was not arriving in Launceston until later, so it meant an evening run over and back to collect her from the airport. We had a sleep-in Sunday morning before we headed off to start Mum & Dad's conference. For us, we got to enjoy watching the trees in the front yard whilst everyone got to dance and enjoy themselves. After the convention, we stayed a few more days in Deloraine but travelled around to sight-see. The first spot was a honey & ice cream shop followed by a Tassie devil refuge and wildlife park – thankfully we were safe inside the motor home. The on to Marapooka Cave – we got told it was terrific, with lots of stalagmites, stalactites, veils and shawls. From here, we travelled on to see lots of seahorses and sea dragons, platypus and echidna and Beaconsfield (post mining disaster) mining museum. The day ended at Dad's niece and her husband's farm at Pipers Brook, where we spent 2 nights. We helped them clean up along some fence lines and even got to see where they hope to have their truffles grow; unfortunately the platypus in their dam was very shy and we didn't see him/her. Their black Angus cattle were well behaved and did not annoy us at all.

Next stop was Scottsdale and Mum was chasing a massage – the local masseuse helped her out and gave us the opportunity to catch with some friends of Dad who were travelling Tassie as well. Then a wrong turn took us to Bridport (not Swansea) where we got to have 2 lovely nights beside the beach. An unexpected beautiful spot! Then on to Swansea where Dad could finally fill up the AdBlue tank and ensure we would get home. We had a couple of days travelling down the East Coast before we met Dad's nephew and his wife and stayed for tea before free camping in nearby Sorell. Our next stop was the Casino in Hobart – Mum wanted to play the pokies for a bit but they don't open until after lunch, so we decided to head on down to Bruny Island and another short ferry (barge) ride across to the island. We headed out before dark to see the penguins arrive before coming back to the caravan park. The next day saw Mum and Dad head off for a boat cruise along the island as far as its southern tip to where the Tasman Sea meets the Southern Ocean, and didn't they talk about how much rougher it was when they got back; all in all, they said it was an absolutely terrific experience even though they did get a bit wet.

After leaving Bruny Island, we headed back to New Norfolk where we got to look at the salmon and trout ponds. This is where the first ponds were established for fish breeding in Australia and the "display" fish are large, even the albino rainbow trout. Sadly, they are not for catching, just display. Mum and Dad headed west towards Queenstown – the road down is very windy and not something Mum enjoyed, although the barren landscape hasn't changed much at all they both said. We stopped here for coffee before going on to Strahan for a couple of nights and another boat trip for them. Strahan was a lovely spot and Mum and Dad really enjoyed the boat trip – Hell's Gates, Sarah Island (really horrible for the convicts) and then up the Gordon River with a short nature walk.

Six hours in all and worth every bit, Dad said. They went back for a play 'The Boat That Never Was' which tells the tale of the last boat built on Sarah Island and the escape by the convicts to Chile. It is a very interactive play, as Mum got to play the role of the parrot with lots of squawking whilst Dad was one of the constables who kept singing 'What Shall We Do With The Drunken Sailor?' A real barrel of laughs.

From Strahan, we headed up to Stanley and The Nut as Mum and Dad had promised themselves a ride up on the chairlift; they played lazy and caught it back down as well. At least they weren't blown away walking around the top. We followed this with a trip to historic Highfield House and then dinner at a local seafood restaurant before heading back towards Devonport and the boat. A leisurely trip along the coast saw us free camp at Penguin and a look at the rubbish bins all shaped like penguins. From here to Burnie and Mum went paper making before we detoured to Don River Railway and a wander through this marvellous train museum all run and maintained on volunteer labour. Well guess what, Mum came out with a new travelling companion – Don – a penguin who can look over all our shoulders. Before we headed off to catch the boat, we visited the Chocolate Factory at Latrobe and the Maritime Museum at Devonport where both Mum and Dad tried their hand at taking a boat out of Devonport. Mum got out ok but not Dad – he ended up under water after colliding with a yacht. Another overnight boat trip back to Melbourne and shortly after docking, we were on our way out of Melbourne. A long day's drive ahead of us to Mr Eric's at St Georges Basin near Nowra. A breakfast stop at Wallan for mum before detouring via Wangaratta for an early lunch. We finally reached Goulburn where we left the highway and travelled on smaller roads. First issue – GPS tried to take us under a low bridge – so we backed up and headed back to cross over the railway line. Then, the proposed route was closed with a detour so Dad re-routed us and off we went. A longer windier route than probably what we needed, but at least we knew where we going and that we would eventually get there, finally arriving at Mr Eric's for the next two nights. Our second night there allowed us to go dancing with Sussex /Shoalhaven Squares and a catch up with old friends there.

The next day we headed off to Tony's for an overnight stop at Wingham; we didn't plan to leave until after lunch and then catch up with some friends at Harrington. Leaving Harrington after 5pm, we planned to stop at Urunga overnight, but couldn't as our beachside stop is closed to camping and motor homes – guess they want you in the nearby caravan park. On we went, eventually getting to Coffs Harbour and an overnight street park before getting home Sunday afternoon. It was a long trip but great for us to see Tasmania and take the boat over and back and we look forward to a future trip there again.

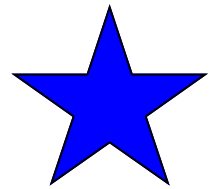
